J. Peter Pham é director do Africa Center do Atlantic Council. Pham foi anteriormente vice-presidente do National Committee on American Foreign Policy e editor da revista bimestral *American Foreign Policy Interests*. Foi, também, professor associado de estudos de justiça, ciência política e estudos africanos da Universidade James Madison, em Harrisonburg, Virgínia, onde acumulou funções com a direcção do Nelson Institute for International and Public Affairs. Desde a sua criação é conselheiro do AFRICOM. Pham é o autor de mais de 300 publicações, incluindo, mais recentemente, *Somalia: Fixing Africa's Most Failed State* (Tafelberg, 2013; co-autoria com Greg Mills e David Kilcullen). Peter Pham contribui regularmente para várias publicações, incluindo *The National Interest* e *Foreign Policy*. Participa, como comentador, em vários meios de comunicação social, incluindo CBS, PBS, VOA, CNN, Fox News Channel, MSNBC, NPR, a BBC, Reuters, Associated Press, Agence France-Presse, *Wall Street Journal*, *New York Times*, *Washington Post*, *Washington Times*, *Today*, *Newsweek*, *EUA News & World Report*, *The Times of London*, *New Statesman*, *Maclean*, o *Le Monde* e *Le Temps*. Um acérrimo defensor da importância do estreitamento das relações entre África e os EUA, Pham fez monitorização das eleições na Libéria (2005), na Nigéria (2007, 2011) e na Somália (2010). Adicionalmente, também é professor convidado de estudos africanos no Foreign Service Institute, no Colégio de Guerra dos EUA e em variadas instituições de ensino norte-americanas. The Royal United Services Institute (RUSI) de Defesa e Estudos de Segurança, a Fundação Brenthurst e a Fundação Nelson Mandela, concedeu a J. Peter Pham, em 2008, o Prémio Internacional Nelson Mandela para a Segurança e o Desenvolvimento Africano pelo seu estudo "*Imagining Congo Secure and Stable*".

J. Peter Pham is the director of the Atlantic Council's Africa Center. Pham was previously senior vice president of the National Committee on American Foreign Policy, and editor of its bimonthly journal, *American Foreign Policy Interests*. He was also a tenured associate professor of justice studies, political science, and African studies at James Madison University in Harrisonburg, Virginia, where he was director of the Nelson Institute for International and Public Affairs. He has served on the Senior Advisory Group of the US Africa Command since its creation. Pham is the author of more than 300 essays and reviews and the author, editor, or translator of over a dozen books, including, most recently, *Somalia: Fixing Africa's Most Failed State* (Tafelberg, 2013; coauthored with Greg Mills and David Kilcullen). Pham also contributes to a number of publications including *The National Interest* and *Foreign Policy*, and regularly appears as a commentator on broadcast and print media outlets including CBS, PBS, VOA, CNN, the Fox News Channel, MSNBC, NPR, the BBC, Reuters, the Associated Press, Agence France-Presse, the *Wall Street Journal*, the *New York Times*, the *Washington Post*, the *Washington Times*, *USA Today*, *Newsweek*, *US News & World Report*, *The Times of London*, *New Statesman*, *Maclean's*, *Le Monde*, and *Le Temps*. A staunch advocate of robust American engagement with Africa, Pham served as member of the USAID-funded International Republican Institute (IRI) delegation monitoring the national elections in Liberia in 2005. He also served on the IRI pre-election assessment (2006) and election observation delegations to Nigeria (2007, 2011) and Somaliland (2010). He is also a frequent guest lecturer on African affairs at the Foreign Service Institute, the US Army War College, the Joint Special Operations University, and other US government professional educational institutions. The Royal United Services Institute (RUSI) for Defence and Security Studies, the Brenthurst Foundation, and the Nelson Mandela Foundation awarded Pham the 2008 Nelson Mandela International Prize for African Security and Development for his study "*Imagining Congo Secure and Stable*."
